# A PARENT'S GUIDE TO PSAT 10



Assessments provide valuable information for students, parents and educators on whether students have mastered grade level and content standards and are on track to graduate prepared for the 21st century. Assessment results provide one measure in a body of evidence of your child's academic progress.



#### WHAT IS THE PSAT 10?

The PSAT 10 is an assessment that students take in the tenth grade to help them understand their academic progress and whether they are prepared for college and career. The PSAT 10 helps students identify the areas of improvement before taking the SAT in the eleventh grade. Since the SAT is used by most colleges and universities to accept students, taking the PSAT is a key step for students preparing to go to college.

The PSAT 10 is aligned to Colorado Academic Standards and measures whether students are on-track in their mastery of the standards. Student scores do not count for grades and are not included on college transcripts. The PSAT 10 covers evidence-based reading and writing and math. The math test will include how students can use math to solve problems in science, social studies, and other career and real-life scenarios. Unlike previous versions, the redesigned PSAT and SAT do not penalize students for the wrong guess.

In May 2015, the state legislation passed a bill requiring all Colorado school districts to find a tenth- and eleventh-grade exam to measure college and career readiness. After a great deal of feedback from our community, Colorado adopted the PSAT 10 and the SAT. Students in grades 3 - 9 will continue to take the CMAS: Math and CMAS: English Language Arts tests.

### WHEN IS MY CHILD BEING TESTED?

The PSAT 10 will be given on April 11 or April 12, 2017 and will be administered using a pencil/paper format. The test is approximately 3 hours long.



# WHAT SCORE(S) WILL MY CHILD RECEIVE?

Students will receive scores between 320 and 1520. This score represents the combined score of student progress in the math section and the reading and writing section. The scores will not be included on student transcripts and will be mailed to students before the end of the school year.



### **HOW WILL THESE SCORES BE USED?**

Students, families and teachers should use these scores to see how prepared students are for the SAT as well as their general preparedness for college and career.

- Students sign up for an account and receive personalized recommendations for areas of improvement based on their scores.
